A model of the 1843 Fort Nisqually bastion was made by Linnie Sutcliffe, Jr. of Bonney Lake and donated to the DuPont Museum.

The model is made to the scale of 1" equals 1 foot. Linnie has made ladders for each floor, a cannon, windows that open and shut, desk and chair and small round kegs. He has also made a case to protect and display the Model on display in the DuPont Museum.
